

Playgroups

What is playgroup?

Playgroups are for children under 5 and their families.
Playgroups are a place to play, learn with other children and make friends

Playgroup helps children:

- Develop play skills
- Socialise
- Develop independence
- Try new things
- R Have fun.

Playgroup helps adults:

- Meet other adults
- Play with your child
- Share ideas, skills and help each other.

Occasional Care

What is occasional care?


Occasional care is a lowcost sessional occasional childcare service.

Who can access occasional care?

Babies over 3 months, toddlers and children under school age who are not accessing alternative early childhood education and care programs, including preschool and childcare or family day care. Ages of children accommodated in occasional care spaces vary along with session days and times.

Where is occasional care located?

Occasional care is offered at some government preschools and Children's Centres in rural and metropolitan areas throughout South Australia. See contact list on page 3 for your nearest Children's Centre location for more information.

Long Day Care

What is long day care?

Long day care is a centrebased service (sometimes called childcare) that provides education and care for children aged from birth to age 6. Charges may vary for this service, contact the centre directly for more information. Families may be eligible for a Child Care subsidy, contact the centre directly or see QR code for more information

Who can access long day care?

Children from birth to age 6, ages of acceptance may vary depending on each site.

Preschool

What is a preschool?

Government preschools support your child's learning and development to give them a great start in life.

Through play-based learning, exploration and experimentation, your child is building important social, emotional and thinking skills to help them thrive.

Who can access preschool?

Children are entitled to access 4 terms (1 year) of government preschool in the year before they start school.

Children who turn 4 years old:

- before 1 May are eligible to start preschool at the beginning of the year.
- on 1 May to 31 October can commence preschool through mid-year intake at the start of term 3 of that year.

Aboriginal children and children in care can access preschool from 3 years of age.

Libraries

Local libraries are a great communal space and offer a range of programs for children and families.

These programs are usually free and include a range of activities including stories, rhymes, dance and play. Sessions are usually aimed at a certain age group such as Baby Time, Toddler Time and Story Time.

Little Big Book Club (Raising Literacy Australia)

Is a book gifting program designed to encourage families to read, sing, talk and play with their children.

Two packs are currently available, one for babies and one for preschoolers.

The baby packs are given to families by a Child and Family Health nurse as part of a home visit. Every South Australian baby is eligible to receive this pack.

The preschool pack is available to children participating in registered preschool programs, and is distributed via the local preschool or Children's Centre.

Child Health

Child and Family Health Service (CaFHS)

CaFHS provides free health checks for South Australian children at key developmental ages between birth and 5 years.

These include:

- 1-4 weeks
- 8 weeks
- | 6 9 months
- 18 24 months
- 3 years
- 4 5 years.

Immunisations

Immunisation starts at birth and are due at 6 weeks of age and at 4, 6, 12 and 18 months of age with a booster due at 4 years of age.
